Minutes of a Meeting of the NH Association of Fire Chiefs

Virtual - Thursday, November 13, 2025

ADMINISTRATION:

Personnel:

We continue to be under a hiring freeze statewide. We currently have 13 open positions. We have been approved to proceed with a hiring process for two full-time Fire Protection Specialists and one Administrative Assistant.

Deputy Phil Biron and Investigator Marianne Heinrich have completed the Certified Fire Investigator program through the NH Fire Academy.

Legislation:

Bills for the 2026 session are still in the LSR phase. Our priorities for this session are an update to the state fire code to the 2024 editions of NFPA 1 & 101, some clean-up on investigation language, and clean-up on incident reporting to align with NERIS. We have provided some input on a few bills so far and we are continuing to review others that may impact the fire service. We will publish a list once bill text has been released.

State Emergency Response Commission (SERC)

<u>Board of Fire Control:</u>

The Board of Fire Control will hold a public hearing on Monday, November 10th at 9 am to address potential code amendments for the 2024 editions of NFPA 1 and NFPA 101.

BUREAU OF INVESTIGATIONS:

In October, we received 18 incident notifications resulting in 12 scene responses. The Bureau of Investigations currently has 9 open arson or suspected arson investigations.

New cases (synopsis of some of our cases are listed below):

- On *October 8, 2025*, investigators received a report from Nashua Fire regarding a 63-year-old male who sustained significant burn injuries from attempting to stomp a fire out. Patient status will be monitored, and Nashua Fire Marshals will investigate the origin and cause of the fire.
- On *October 8, 2025*, investigators received a report from Nashua Fire regarding a 12-year-old female who sustained significant burn injuries from an incident involving cooking. Patient status will be monitored.
- On *October 9, 2025*, investigators were notified and responded the following morning to Newton for a consultation regarding a structure fire in a vacant residential structure. The fire caused significant damage, leaving the structure unsafe for a scene examination. The fire was believed to have started in a rear corner of the structure, but the cause is undetermined.
- On *October 11, 2025*, investigators responded to Salem to assist with a structure fire where a 70-year-old male inside the home sustained significant injuries. While the circumstances surrounding this incident are still under investigation, the cause of the fire was classified as accidental. The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office is leading this investigation with the assistance of the Salem Police and Fire Departments and New Hampshire State Police.
- On *October 17, 2025*, investigators responded to assist the Kensington Fire Department with the investigation of a structure fire. Additionally, a 50-year-old male and a 45-year-old female were transported to a nearby hospital with injuries from the fire. The cause of the fire is still under investigation; however, no criminal indicators have been identified to date.
- On *October 18, 2025*, investigators responded to Ashland to assist with an investigation into the origin and cause of a structure fire. While the investigation is still ongoing, investigators have identified criminal indicators that suggested this fire was intentionally set. The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office is leading this investigation with the assistance of the Ashland Police and Fire Departments.
- On *October 19, 2025*, a K9 team responded to Nashua to assist with an investigation into the origin and cause of a motor vehicle fire. While the investigation is still ongoing by the Nashua Fire Marshal's Office and the Nashua Police Department, criminal indicators have been identified that suggested this fire was intentionally set.
- On *October 19, 2025*, an investigator responded to Hudson to assist with an investigation into the origin and cause of a structure fire. The fire appeared to have started on the exterior of the building. While the investigation is still ongoing, no criminal indicators have been identified.

- On *October 20, 2025*, investigators received a report from Concord Fire Department regarding a fire at a church. The fire was determined to have been an arson, at which time the SFMO contacted the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF) on behalf of Concord. Concord Fire and Concord Police are leading this investigation.
- On *October 21, 2025*, investigators and a K9 team responded to Henniker to assist with an investigation into the origin and cause of a camper fire. While the investigation is still ongoing, investigators have identified criminal indicators that suggested this fire was intentionally set. The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office is leading this investigation with the assistance of the Henniker Police and Fire Departments.
- On October 29, 2025, investigators and inspectors from the Mechanical Safety Section responded to an assisted living facility in Hanover to assist with a propane-fueled boiler explosion, which caused injuries to a technician who was working on the system. Ultimately, the facility needed to be temporarily closed due to no heat, and approximately 60 residents had to be relocated to other facilities. The explosion appears to be accidental.
- On October 30, 2025, investigators and a K9 team responded to Stratford to assist with a suspicious fire involving a camper and a mobile home. During the course of this investigation, probable cause was gathered to identify a suspect who had set the fire. The suspect was arrested later that same day and was held overnight for an arraignment the following day. At his arraignment, the judge ordered the individual to be held on preventative detention until a probable cause hearing, which is scheduled in November.

Fatal Fire/CO Incidents:

- On *October 12, 2025*, an investigator responded to a fatal motor vehicle collision in Ashland that caught fire. A 21-year-old male was identified as the deceased, having been trapped in the vehicle. The cause of death was smoke inhalation and thermal injuries, and the manner was ruled accidental. The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office, in conjunction with New Hampshire State Police, Ashland Fire Department, and the New Hampshire State Medical Examiner's Office, worked on this investigation.
- On *October 17, 2025*, investigators responded to a fatal motor vehicle collision in Fremont that caught fire. A 25-year-old male was identified as the deceased. The cause of death was from injuries sustained in the collision, not the fire, and the manner was ruled accidental. The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office, in conjunction with the Fremont Police Department, the Fremont Fire Department, and the New Hampshire State Medical Examiner's Office, worked on this investigation.
- On *October 26, 2025*, investigators responded to Colebrook to assist with an investigation into the origin and cause of a structure fire. A 59-year-old

male was discovered in the apartment where the fire occurred and had sustained serious bodily injury. The occupant was subsequently removed from the apartment and rendered aid and eventually transferred to Massachusetts General Hospital, where he succumbed to his injuries on October 29, 2025. The investigation into the fire is still underway, and the cause and manner of death are pending. The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office worked alongside the Colebrook Fire Department and Colebrook Police Department.

Arrests/Court:

• An investigator testified at the Candia District Court in a criminal trial stemming from an arson investigation in April 2025. New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office worked closely with the Raymond Police Department throughout this investigation.

The New Hampshire State Fire Marshals' Office requests that **ANY** incidents of reported fires occurring on the property of churches or religious establishments be communicated to us and then we will notify the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF). This request is made in conjunction with our collaboration with the ATF for the purposes of data collection.

To report an incident during business hours, call the NH State Fire Marshal's Office at **603-223-4289**. For incidents after hours or on weekends, contact New Hampshire State Police Communications at **603-223-4381**; they will notify the duty supervisor, who will reach out to you directly.

BUREAU OF OUTREACH & EDUCATION:

Hazardous Materials:

In the month of October, the hazardous materials section attended the Hazmat Collaborative meeting in Concord and presented training about PEAC software in Hampton. There were no incident responses or consultations. Contact us at: hazmat@dos.nh.gov.

Incident Reporting:

We continue to monitor the development of the U.S. Fire Administration's (USFA) new fire information and analytics platform, known as the National Emergency Response Information System (NERIS), for the American fire and emergency services. New Hampshire began on boarding fire departments on October 1st.

Onboarding is a two-step process. The first step registers the department and creates two primary contacts with the NERIS system. The second step is entering incident data which will come later. All fire departments should have received an e-mail from Underwriter's Laboratory, Fire Safety Research Institute, NERIS Office with the onboarding instructions. Once you have completed the first step you will then work with your software vendor to set up actual data entry. It is very important to be sure that your department is verified by checking the appropriate box and saving the verification step. Do not worry about boundary issues or dispatch center ID's at this time. These known issues will be addressed later. You can verify your department regardless of these known issues.

As we have mentioned before, NFIRS will end December 31, 2025. Please make sure that you have a plan for the transition to NERIS. If you are an e-NFIRS user, you should switch to the Image Trend Elite software now. Please contact the data analysis section at nhfirs@dos.nh.gov to get started. If you have a third-party vendor software package, please contact your vendor and work with them to switch your data collection method over from NFIRS to NERIS sometime between October and December.

Data reporting will not occur in both systems simultaneously. Once you switch over from NFIRS to NERIS, you will not be required to continue reporting in NFIRS. Once your vendor is ready to submit your data, please call the Data and Analysis section to let us know the date that you plan to switch to NERIS. Our goal is to eliminate the chance of gaps in data for the state. Please set your department up for success by preparing for NERIS now.

We would like to remind all fire departments that if you experience a fatal fire with civilian injuries in your community, you will need to complete the Civilian Casualty module for your incident report in addition to calling our office for investigative assistance.

Your responses help the Bureau of Outreach and Education better support fire departments and communities across the state. This will inform us about the resources and trainings we create in 2026.

Outreach Events:

The New Hampshire State Fire Marshal's Office participated in 28 public outreach events and provided equipment for 3 events this October. This includes school visits to New Boston, Monroe, New Hampton, and Dublin. For Fire Prevention Week, we focused on educating students about why lithium-ion batteries can become a fire risk and how to store, charge, and recycle their devices responsibly. We brought an interactive activity for students to learn about devices with lithium-ion batteries and how thermal runaway can occur when they are damaged.

The Bureau of Outreach and Education was invited to co-speak at a <u>Community Wildfire Awareness Event</u> in Henniker where residents learned about reducing hazards around their homes and neighborhoods. Henniker is among the first towns in New Hampshire to begin developing a Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). This project highlights effective local engagement and how it can strengthen wildfire preparedness.

We have continued to meet with the new network for fire & life safety educators. We have monthly virtual calls to discuss topics from our communities, share resources, and occasionally bring in guest speakers on key topics in community risk reduction and public safety education.

- ➤ The Raymond S. Burton Fire and EMS Training Facility infrastructure project continues to move forward with completion of the project expected by the end of November 2025.
- ➤ The Law Enforcement Officers, Professional Firefighters, and Emergency Medical Technicians Career Development, Recruitment and Retention Program established in New Hampshire RSA 188-F:70 remains active and available.

Testing

- Monthly Testing was completed in October for the NFPA 1001, 1002 and 1003 testing processes, which includes administering the written and practical exams.
 - Monthly testing is the 2nd Tuesday of every month, with Firefighter I physical exams on the following Saturday. Burton campus monthly testing is only in March, June, September and December on the Wednesday after the Flynn campus exam date. Submissions must be entered by the last day of the month prior to the month you wish to test.
- ➤ We have expanded our training to provide additional proctors for the new written exam testing that is now done on iPads.

Apparatus/Equipment

- All of our pumping apparatus, except Crash 5, underwent annual pump testing on October 9th. Engine Two failed this test, has subsequently been repaired, and is awaiting a follow-up test.

- ➤ EMS in the Warm Zone program is progressing and nearly ready for SME review.
- ➤ The WordPress based Resource Center is functioning with limited ability to adjust certain components.
 - The Drupal-based State website is up and running.
 - Course catalog migration is on hold.
- Classrooms 5/6/7 are in limited service. New cabling and a media switch purchase are being considered.

Instructors

- ➤ New State Fire Instructor applications are available on RespondNH.
- ➤ The Fire Training Captains have been actively training and endorsing Instructors and Program Assistants in numerous classes and prop operations.
 - Many instructors are working through their endorsement process for the new tablet-based Questionmark testing platform.

CPAT

- ➤ There are six CPAT dates in 2025. We restructured the schedule of these exams to better span the entire year to make this test more aligned with department hiring needs. Our final test of the year is as follows:

FIREFIGHTING EOUIPMENT

We just received a new UTV which will be capable of carrying a 50-gallon skid unit. This was purchased with federal grant funds and will be housed out of our Bear Brook facility

in Allenstown. This UTV is identical to the one we purchased last year with similar funds and is housed at our Lancaster facility. We are in the process of finishing a new Command Trailer which will replace the 20 year old command trailer. The new trailer is smaller and easier to tow and will provide some office space and a mobile radio.

We have built up our UAS program over the past couple of years and now have 2 forest ranger pilots. Our drones are small and are housed with the drone pilots so they are in the field and quicker to deploy. We currently have: 2 Thermal Anzu Raptors and 3 DJI Mini. Below are 3 examples of how we have deployed them this

-North Hampton – Thermal imagery detected fifteen different underground hotspots that were invisible to the naked eye. This allowed us to quickly and fully extinguish the fire under drought conditions and prevent a rekindle.



-North Conway – "Sized up" the brush fire to obtain situational awareness. Determined location, size, structures damaged/threatened, direction of travel, and fire behavior by

-Blue Job Prescribed Fire (Farmington) – Utilized the drone to monitor fire behavior during a prescribed burn. "Patrolled" with the drone to ensure no fire passed over our control line.

VFA GRANT FUNDS

We continue to offer VFA Grant Funds to fire departments. To better serve communities and allow time for processing, we have a new timeline for the Volunteer Fire Assistance (VFA) grants to fire suppression organizations in communities of less than 10,000 in population. Due to some changes in the state process for approving and processing pass-through grants to your communities, we are adjusting the timeline to allow for a more streamlined approach.

The Division of Forests and Lands (F&L) will have funding available from the United States Forest Service for the 2026 VFA Grant Program. We anticipate keeping the award amount for the 50/50 grant at up to \$2,000 (grant funds) per community. Reminder - the new timeline is as follows:

TRAINING

We will be developing our Spring Warden Training content over the winter. If you have something from this past 2025 season that you feel we could incorporate into our training sessions, please let your local forest ranger know. It is always good to have content that is based off of lessons learned.

FIRE SEASON

The fall fire season was not as busy as expected due to the statewide fire prohibition and the work local fire departments and forest fire wardens to educate the public. We worked with the Governor's office in mid-October to amend the original proclamation to allow small outdoor fires at planned public events. This required further planning at the local level, including a wildfire response plan which we provided a template for. This was very successful where it was used and allowed some Halloween events to have small fires.

- (U) **Arson Attacks/Fire as a Weapon**: The United States faces increasingly complex threats from terrorism and targeted violence. Incidents of fire used as a weapon have increased recently as threat actors choose the readily available means for an attack. Assailants have used fire as a weapon to target public gathering events and individuals directly. Historically, criminal actors used fire as a weapon to target critical infrastructure. Among others incidents, the September 2025 Michigan attack where a vehicle was used to ram a church, occupants were subsequently shot at, and the facility was set on fire, highlight our concern. Additional explosives were found in the suspects' vehicle. (*Source: DHS CISA, CNN, National Fire Service Intelligence Exchange*)
- (U) **Unhoused Populations:** The NHIAC reminds all first responders to use caution when responding to encampments etc. An individuals homelessness should not be taken as a diminished risk to responding personnel. In fact, circumstances may often require a higher need for vigilance. (Source: National Fire Service Intelligence Exchange)
- (U) **Operation Flashpoint:** A memo has been sent out in a few editions of the NHIAC monthly Fire/EMS Bulletin regarding Operation Flashpoint. The awareness campaign was developed in partnership by FBI and DHS. See this link to review the program overview and objectives <u>Operation Flashpoint Program | CISA</u>. Members of the NHIAC continue to be out in NH communities working with businesses on bomb making materials awareness. As we all know, some of the materials used in the Boston Marathon bombing were purchased locally. An

educational and informational program has been developed and is being presented which includes visual aids and informational sessions by members of the NHIAC.

- (U) **Large Public Gatherings:** The NHIAC reminds you that large gatherings remain a vulnerable target for attacks, including vehicle ramming, particularly with the upcoming holiday season.
- (U) **UAS/Drone Activity:** The NHIAC is interested in drone activity conflicting with Fire/EMS operations. Please report any incidents of drones flying or hovering around your emergency operations or fire stations to Law Enforcement, particularly in reconnaissance type of behavior. - b) Waivers have been submitted for key positions in the Division due to the State hiring freeze.
 - c) Rural Health Transformation (RHT) Grant-\$100 million dollars each year for 5 years and an additional 50 million depending on State presentation.
 - i) The Division reviewed proposals for what the funds should be used for.
 - ii) The State submitted four "buckets" the funding should go towards:
 - (a) MIH (Mobile Integrated Healthcare) program support.
 - (b) Workforce development and education funding- EMR-Paramedic.
 - (c) Bariatric equipment replacement/expansion.
 - (d) Resource and patient tracking software for large events.
 - (d) A discussion was held on the lack of consultation with the TMRC, and the committee felt that trauma system priorities were not represented. The

committee will develop proactive strategic plans referencing ACS recommendations. Chair Clough instructed all seated members and public members to consider some strategic goals for the TMRC and submit to him, and will discuss at the next meeting in December.
