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Minutes of a Meeting of the NH Association of Fire Chiefs

Thursday, May 11, 2023 - NH Fire Academy, Concord, NH

The meeting was called to order at 0914 hours by Chief Best.

After a salute to the flag, a moment of silence was requested for departed members.

Director Cutting welcomed all to the Academy.

Chief Best introduced Chief Carrier who spoke on the FY 24 budget. A MOTION (Sitar/Fraitzl) to approve the budget carried unanimously.

^{1st} Vice President Report (Emanuel) –

Seacoast Chief Fire Officer Mutual Aid District is hosting New Haven fire chief John Alston as a national speaker on May 25, 2023 at UNH. https://chiefjohnalstonseminar.rsvpify.com

The Seacoast Chiefs have been working with the Director of NHFST and EMS regarding the NH Administrative rules about course registration and pricing for NHFA programs/classes for non-NH residents or non-NH fire departments. Mutual aid partners from Maine and Massachusetts are permitted to attend NHFA programs if there is seating availability and they will be charged out of state pricing.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: If you have questions about a bill, reach out to us, and we can either provide an answer or request follow up information from our lobbyist.

• **HB 2 (budget trailer bill)** – The NH state budget is comprised of 2 bills, HB 1 which includes traditional budget line items and HB 2 which includes all the changes to law necessary to implement the budget. The House passed both bills last week with a number of amendments. Amendments included the language from HB 436. HB 436 was originally introduced to eliminate the "middle tier" in Group II. The language makes changes to current law to phase out the differences between those who were grandfathered prior to the 2011 changes and those were not yet vested when the changes were made. In addition, there are appropriations made to ensure that employers do not experience additional costs. It is unclear if this provision will be approved by the Senate Finance Committee. There is language to implement an increase Medicaid rates for ambulance services.

Also, earlier this week, funding was added to create a law enforcement, professional firefighters, and EMT career development, recruitment and retention program. We will see if the language makes through the rest of the process. The language is similar to SB 153 which NHAFC supported earlier this year.

- SB 71 (Workers' Compensation for Firefighters with Cancer/Committee to Study Annual Cancer Screening) NHAFC supported the bill in the Senate where it passed without too much debate. The hearing in the House Executive Departments and Administration was held last month. Chief Best attended and provided testimony. The committee had a number of questions regarding the potential impacts of the proposed expansion of cancer coverage. Ultimately, the committee voted to pass the bill with an amendment. The amendment removed the committee to study annual cancer screenings. The Senate will now consider the revisions from the House.
- **HB 296 (Driveway permits)** NHAFC opposed the bill as introduced. Marshal Toomey, NHAFC, and the bill sponsor continued to work on language to balance the concerns of access to a property. Ultimately, the Senate adopted an amendment which requires local land use board to give "...due consideration to any written recommendations of the municipal fire chief..." regarding issues involving width, vertical clearance, grade, suitability of road surface, bridges, dead ends, and ability to pass/turn around. The Senate passed the amendment last month. We are now awaiting the House consideration of the changes.
- **HB 564 (code updates)** NHAFC supported the bill in the House and Senate. This bill ratifies amendments to the state building code and fire code approved by the state building code review board, ratifies amendments to the state fire code approved by the Fire Marshal and state board of fire contract, and adds a fire protection engineer to the state board of fire control. The bill has passed both bodies and we are awaiting action by Governor Sununu.
- HB 461 (Elimination by Political Subdivision Employers of a Retirement System Position) This bill would require political subdivisions to

obtain an analysis from the retirement system and continue to pay unfunded accrued liability contributions when eliminating or transferring an employment position from full time to part time. The bill passed the House rather easily. At the Senate hearing, the bill was opposed by both the NH Municipal Association and NH Association of Counties. Generally, both argued that elimination of a full time position (like Fire of Police Chief) could be made for a number of reasons. Further, the potential financial penalties assessed to the employers would be significant. They thought the purview of the decisions about full or part time position should remain with the employers. The Senate will vote on an amendment that passed the committee which creates a study committee (1 Senator and 4 House members) which would "...study the elimination by political subdivision employers under RSA 100-A of a retirement system eligible employment position." If the Senate approves the amendment, the House will have to consider the change.

IAFC Safety Stand Down 2023

The 2023 Safety Stand Down takes place June 18-24 and focuses on lithium-ion battery response with the theme "Lithium-Ion Batteries: Are you Ready?" Five daily focus areas highlight different aspects of this critical safety topic. Additional planning materials and resources will be added to this web site leading up to Safety Stand Down.

Taking place each year during the third full week of June, Safety Stand Down highlights critical safety, health, and survival issues for fire and emergency services personnel. Departments are asked to suspend all non-emergency activities during the week to focus their attention on safety and health education efforts. A week is provided to ensure that all duty shifts can participate.

Firefighters are exposed to chemicals on the fireground that could increase their risk of developing cancer. There are many unanswered questions about how cancer risk may vary across our nation's diverse fire service.

Board of Fire Control:

The Board of Fire Control and the SFMO staff have started the review of the 2021 editions of NFPA 1 and NFPA 101. The goal is to have a package ready for legislative action in 2024.

Foam Take-back Program:

We continue to work with DES to launch the foam take-back program. Due to contracting and permitting challenges the launch of this program project for late spring/early summer 2023. An important consideration in the program is the best and safest disposal methods to destroy the PFAS chemicals. The latest inventory is approximately 9,600 gallons. We are working with DES to identify collection points in each county.

BUREAU OF INVESTIGATIONS:

In the month of April, we received 27 incident notifications resulting in 14 scene responses. The Bureau of Investigations currently has 16 open arson or suspected arson investigations.

New cases (synopsis of some of our cases are listed below):

- On April 1, investigators responded to New London for two condominium fires suspected to be arson. This investigation is ongoing.
- On April 4, investigators responded to Plymouth for a suspicious fire later determined to be accidental.

- On April 10, investigators responded to assist Manchester Fire Department with a house fire resulting in serious injury. The cause of the fire is undetermined but believed to be accidental.
- On April 11, investigators responded to Epsom for a second fire at a vacant house that was previously set on fire in January. Both fires are considered to be arson.
- On April 15, investigators responded to Raymond for a house fire. The cause was undetermined but likely accidental.
- On April 20, an investigator responded to Barrington to assist with a fire investigation for a house under construction. The cause was likely accidental.
- On April 23, investigators responded to Weare for a house fire. The cause was accidental.
- On April 23, an investigator assisted Merrimack Fire Department with interviews related to an accidental house fire.
- On April 24, an investigator responded to Winchester for two motor-vehicle fires. The cause was undetermined but likely accidental.
- On April 26, investigators responded to Sunapee for a vehicle and structure fire.
 The cause is undetermined but suspected to be arson due to criminal circumstances involving the theft of the truck.
- On April 26, investigators also responded to Campton for a structure fire. One subject admitted to setting the fire and was arrested by Campton Police.
- On May 1, an investigator responded to Litchfield to investigate a structure fire that occurred on April 30. The cause was likely accidental.

Fatal Fire/CO Incidents:

- There were 2 fatal fire incidents in April and one non-fire fatality that the BOI investigated.
 - A man died in Chester on April 10 in proximity to an outside brush fire. His death was determined to be natural and not related to the fire
 - A man died from injuries sustained in a house fire in Meredith on April 17. The FMO responded to the scene to investigate. The cause of the fire was undetermined but not suspected to be arson.
 - A man died from injuries sustained in a motor vehicle fire in Rollinsford on April 27. The FMO investigated the fire and determined it was the result of a crash and accidental.

Ignitable Liquid Detection Canine Teams:

- There were 3 IGL canine deployments in April.
- IGL canine teams performed demonstrations in Jaffrey, Plymouth, Northumberland, Warner and Concord.

• Both IGL canine teams were in the process of completing their annual recertification.

Youth Firesetter:

• There were no youth fire setter assessments in April; however, two potential YFS cases were reported that we will investigate.

Arrests:

• FMO assisted the Campton Fire and Police by performing a fire investigation after their arrest of Jonas Gurrera for arson on April 26.

Court:

- An investigator testified in a deposition for a 2021 arson case from Webster.
- The Merrimack County Attorney's Office reached a plea deal for an incident where an investigator was scheduled to testify, involving a youth being burned at a campfire.

Training/Committees:

- Two investigators attended the International Association of Arson Investigators' (IAAI) International Training Conference in North Carolina.
- Two investigators are currently in the fire academy recruit school.

BUREAU OF BUILDING SAFETY & CONSTRUCTION:

State Building Permit System:

We processed the following permits in the month of April:

Technical Assistance, Educational & Healthcare Reviews:

We initiated 24 educational and 11 healthcare plan reviews, completed 95 inspections and 166 technical consults in the month of April.

Variance Requests:

We processed 10 variance requests in the month of April.

BUREAU OF OUTREACH & EDUCATION:

Hazardous Materials:

Hazardous Materials response, coordination and consultation is available through the oncall FMO

supervisor. Our Hazardous Materials Coordinator is available for PEAC Software training for fire

departments. PEAC is used for documentation of Tier II facilities and chemical storage.

In the month of April, our Hazardous Materials Coordinator continued to attend the regional Haz Mat team trainings to offer support and provide updates regarding statewide Haz Mat response. He also continued to work with the regional Haz Mat teams and HSEM on planning a Wide Area Monitoring Exercise for this spring.

We continue to work on Tier II reporting and associated follow-ups when deficiencies are identified.

Our Hazardous Materials Coordinator attended the National Association of Sara Title Three Program Officials Conference. This conference focuses on the Emergency Preparedness and Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA), including Tier II reporting by facilities and operations of State Emergency Response Commissions and Local Emergency Planning Committees.

Further discussions and work are ongoing to evaluate the hazmat problem and funding sources.

Swiftwater Rescue Working Group:

Further discussions and work is ongoing to evaluate the swiftwater problem and funding sources.

Regional Outreach/Chief's Roundtables:

We continue to partner with the Commissioner's Office, other Department of Safety Leadership and the NHAFC to conduct regional outreach/Chief's Roundtables. We held a North Country Roundtable at the Burton Fire & EMS Training Facility on April 20th. We have scheduled a Souhegan Area Roundtable for September 13th in Mont Vernon.

We are asking that fire departments please submit their 2022 NFIRS data as soon as possible so we can close out the year in a timely fashion. The deadline is fast approaching!




Members of the NHFMO also attended four career and internship fairs at Groveton High School, Conant High School, the University of New Hampshire and Plymouth State University in the month of April.





Public Education:

Arson Awareness Week is May 7-13, 2023. The theme this year is Understanding and Mitigating Youth Firesetting Issues. Youth firesetting is a problem throughout the United States and around the world. Fire misuse behaviors in children may be attributed to issues such as curiosity or experimentation, underlying struggles with impulse control, emotional regulation, social/interpersonal skills, childhood trauma or other behavioral health conditions. Children observe adults using matches and lighters but may not be taught about important fire safety practices. They may also observe unsafe uses of fire in media, videos and gaming.

<u>Fire Standards/Training/EMS</u> – (Director Cutting) ADMINISTRATION

Personnel

- ➤ We have made conditional offers for our remaining open full-time Fire Service Instructor Supervisor (Captain) positions and are working through the hiring process.
- ➤ Don Himsel has been promoted to Program Specialist IV (Education Technology Manager) of the Educational Technology section of the Division and we will begin the process to fill his position.

➤ Our part-time Program Coordinator positions for Fire Officer, Promotional Coordinator, Instructor, Swift Water and EMS Initial Programs are open and we are seeking applicants.

Grants

- The architectural firm retained for the Raymond S. Burton Fire and EMS Training Facility project is proceeding with obtaining necessary permits and completion of the construction documents in preparation of advertising the project for bids.
 - As we continue to overcome the challenge of significant price increases in construction costs over the last year we have begun the process to move forward with phase one of the project. Land clearing is expected to begin this fall/winter with site work starting in the spring of 2024.
- ➤ We are working with the Department of Health and Human Services Covid Disparities Funding program to expand Image Trend to add Continuum, additional IFT, MIH and simulation training and staff support.
- ➤ We have not yet received a response on our application for a grant for \$471,000 through the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act funding available at the Department of Business and Economic Affairs to fund a comprehensive campaign designed to recruit firefighters and EMS providers in our state.
- ➤ The NH EMT Training Program remains active with grant funding for training new and existing EMS providers. Contact our Division or NH Employment Security for details and question.

Fire Standards and Training Commission / Curriculum

- The next Fire Standards and Training Commission meeting will be September 7th at 0930 in Classrooms 5/6 in the dormitory building at the main campus. The full schedule for 2023 also includes a meeting November 2nd.
 - As part of the standard review process following two course deliveries, or one year of a program delivery, after a curriculum revision, the Commission and Division staff review each curriculum. This analysis was completed for Fire and Emergency Services Instructor I and II and the Commission voted to approve the recommended changes.
 - The Visiting Committee for the development of a Fire Officer III & IV program has been paused at this time.
 - The Technical Rescue Program Rope Operations and Technician have completed their work and presented to the Curriculum committee. The full FSTC has approved the written comment period to open through July 19, 2023 for public comment on the proposed changes to the following curriculums: Rope Rescue Awareness, Operations and Technician. - The Commission voted at the May meeting to establish a Visiting Committee for the NFPA 472 Hazmat Materials Awareness, Operations, Decontamination and Technician programs which will be seated by the Commission and begin their work this summer. Anyone interested please submit your information by July 19, 2023 at https://nhfa-ems.com/visiting-committee-membership-request-form/
- The Commission approved the amended Fire rules as recommended by Administrative Rules Sub-Committee relative to the Recruitment and Retention report and its recommendations. We will begin the process to move through the Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules which will include public input.
- Assistant Commissioner Steven Lavoie has been appointed as the Commissioner of Safety designee to the Commission following the retirement of Assistant Commissioner Rick Bailey.

Special Projects

- ➤ We upgraded the current Online Learning Academy to a new platform in early 2023. We have identified some technical issues that have impacted certain programs and are working towards a resolution including a redesign of course content with an improved student experience through updated navigation, orientation, resources and student surveys.
- ➤ The tuition for courses for FY 24 conducted by the Division have been posted to our website and can be found at https://www.nh.gov/safety/divisions/fstems/documents/CourseCostFY24.pdf
- ➤ We continue the analysis of current standard operating procedures and are working to implement numerous new policies.

Facilities

- ➤ A vendor has been selected to complete the "B" building upgrades that are needed and we are working through the approval process with the Governor and Executive Council.
- ➤ We continue to work with NH Public Works on getting the design and engineering complete to repair the roadway washout on the south side of the drill yard at the Concord campus. Estimates for repair were approximately \$260,000.
- > We are working on the replacement of two AC condenser units in the dormitory building.

Legislative/Administrative Rules

- ➤ The new legislative session is ongoing and we are tracking a number of bills. A few include:
 - o HB 2 Budget, Naloxone licensing and Fire and EMS fund
 - HB 183 Relative to Employment of Retired Firefighters at the Fire Academy (retained by the Committee)
 - HB 373 Relative to Billing for Ambulance Services (retained by the Committee)
 - SB 71 Relative to workers' compensation for firefighter cancer disease and establishing a commission to study the implementation of optional annual cancer screenings (House amended to exclude study commission)
 - SB 153 Relative to establishing a First Responder Career Development,
 Recruitment and Retention program (tabled)
 - o SB 204 Requiring Trauma Kits to be Available in State-Owned Buildings
 - SB 268 Allowing for Pre-Hospital Treatment and Transportation for Operational Canines
- ➤ We continue our work in partnership with the Police Academy to develop a more comprehensive program for PTSD training utilizing experts from this field in development of the curriculum.

Outreach

- ➤ We continue finalizing the Spring of 2024 training program schedule.
- ➤ We are continuing our Leadership Roundtables with the Commissioner, Fire Marshal's Office, HSEM and Emergency Services and Communications with regional Fire Chief's and EMD's.
 - Souhegan Mutual Aid group is planned for September 13th.

Mental Health & Resiliency

- Difficult Conversations: Preventing Responder Suicide and Promoting Resilience
 May 15th.
 - This will be a three-part presentation. The first two speakers will discuss suicide from the perspective of a family whose spouse was a career firefighter and completed suicide in 2020 as well as a clinical social worker who has specifically worked in the mental health field developing suicide prevention and postintervention programs. 
